## Highlights

I'd like to share two highlights from last year.

The first highlight that I'd like to celebrate is the Sunset staff. Last year felt like a turning point. We have a dedicated and unified group of people who are committed to seeing Sunset flourish and sharing the Good News of Jesus.

Sunset's Church Administrator, Bob Thomas, led our ministry staff through a thoughtful process of creating short-term goals for Sunset Church. We unanimously unified around three primary goals for our church over the next three to five years.

The first goal is creating flourishing children and youth ministries. While we remain committed to being an intergenerational church, we recognized that young adults weren't actively present in our congregation. For a church to survive long-term, we need to focus on bringing young adults and young families into our community. We believe the gift of our physical location and facilities allows us to serve our children and youth in a special way.


Second, we named a goal to build loving and joyful connections with Jesus and others. As a staff, we read and discussed *The Other Half of Church*. We all resonated with the importance of creating a vibrant and joyful culture at Sunset. We continue to work toward every person being welcomed into the doors of this church with genuine delight that they are here.

Lastly, the third goal is to develop well-equipped leaders functioning with joy. We realize as a staff that we cannot fulfill our ministry dreams without volunteers. Our volunteers are vital to all our ministries. We deeply desire to equip our leaders and volunteer leaders in such a way that they experience joy as they serve others in love.

The Sunset staff also went through the process of individual goal setting. These individual goals helped create actionable steps toward reaching the three-to-five year goals and flourishing the ministries God has entrusted to our care. I'm celebrating that the entire staff leaned into this process through collaboration, feedback, and encouragement.



Every Tuesday all Sunset staff gather together to share good news stories, provide ministry updates, and pray for one another. When I look around the room, I thank God for each and every staff member. It gives me great joy to hear their laughter when we gather. The staff culture and work that we accomplished together gave me great hope for the future of the church.





and reflections that were developed by St. Ignatius of Loyola in the 16th-century. They are intended to help people deepen their relationship with God. I was inspired to do Ignatian Prayer Exercises after watching my wife, Michelle, lead groups of women through these exercises. One of our church members, Janet Eney, led three other men and me through a nine-month journey of prayer. I prayed for about one hour every day with the goal to fall madly in love with Jesus. It was a transformative experience in my spiritual journey. One of the Ignatian prayer elements is called "The Loving Gaze" where Ignatius invites us to begin our prayer by imagining the loving gaze of God. He also invites us to pray imaginatively in the scriptures. After a breakthrough in prayer, I began to imagine holding Jesus's hand as his friend as I read the story of his life and ministry in the gospels. I feel like I know and love Jesus more through those nine months of prayer.

## **Good News Story**

Last year, a beloved former elder, Wayne Moore, battled a resurgence of cancer. He decided to try the CAR T-Cell treatments. This was a long process with extended stays in the hospital. Due to Wayne's compromised immune system and vulnerability to infection, he and his wife, Lynn, were not able to attend worship regularly. After all of the treatments and recovery time was completed, I was thrilled to see both Wayne and Lynn in the sanctuary. Lynn said something I'll never forget. She said, "People have said they have missed seeing us at church over the last four months, but I felt like we never left. Our church community surrounded and took care of us spiritually with love and prayer and physically by providing food. So, we were never away from the church, the church just came to us." To me, this story speaks to the value of building joyful and loving connections. Wayne and Lynn's connection to Jesus was their rock and firm foundation during his illness. This church community, especially their small group, became the hands and feet of God's steadfast love through Jesus Christ. Stories like this give me great hope that we will continue to see the Holy Spirit build joyful and loving connections at Sunset Church in the years to come.

#### Vision

My vision for the next ministry year (October 2024-September 2025) is that we would practice the way of Jesus as an entire church community. Using *Practicing the Way* by John Mark Comer as a resource, we are offering an introduction to spiritual formation. We are learning what it means to follow Jesus as his apprentice. The three driving goals of an apprentice are to be with Jesus, to become more like him, and to do as he did. We are all being spiritually formed, and much of our spiritual formation is unintentional. As we become more aware of the forces that are forming us, we consider Jesus's way as a counter formation to unintentional spiritual formation. And we will learn the nine spiritual practices that can help form us to become more like Jesus.

With this foundational understanding of how spiritual practices fit into formation, we will begin practicing all nine spiritual practices together over the next few years. We are planning to teach three sermon series on individual practices in the next year. I am looking forward to seeing how we as a community will be formed more into the likeness of Christ in the years ahead. I am especially excited to explore spiritual practices as a community. I hope and pray that as we practice the way of Jesus, we will not only grow in Christ but grow in unity as the body of Christ.

Dear Faithful People of Sunset Church,

The Lord has blessed Sunset both in ministry and through your financial support. I continue to be profoundly appreciative, humbled, and blessed by the staff and body of believers who love Jesus Christ! The following is a summary of some of the operational highlights of the year.

**Strategy Alignment:** The staff spent the last year working to create clarity around Sunset's purpose and vision for the future. Sunset's staff are fully engaged in this process, and the result has been the development of:

- Simplified Core Values
- · Long-Term Goals around children, youth and families, equipped leaders, and a connected culture
- Annual Goals for each ministry with collaborative objectives that align with long-term goals

**Human Resources:** After reading *The Other Half of Church*, Sunset staff felt it would be wise and proactive to spend time working on our team culture. A special thank you to Carrie Peeples, Maddie Martinez, and Laura VanderGiessen (the culture team) for leading this effort.

- Staff participated in a team culture assessment that led to the development of clear actions for regular communication, connection, and engagement with leadership.
- The culture team led the staff in developing value commitments to govern how to work and communicate well with
- The human resource team implemented an annual performance review process which occurs in the first quarter of every calendar year.

Community Connection: Sunset continues to be a connection point for the local community using the amazing building God has provided. Over 30 different organizations have used the church space this year, serving tens of thousands of people that have come through the doors. There have been events, church gatherings, and outreaches for local Chinese, Bangladeshi, Indian, Hispanic, Filipino, and Ghanese communities as well as for homeless and special needs populations. Two concerts with well-known Christian musicians and a comedian were hosted. The largest events were the Mission Connexion conference and Portland's Singing Christmas Tree. This fall, Sunset has been very blessed to welcome the upper school (6th through 12th grade) at St. Stephen's Christian Academy. St. Stephen's graciously converted and paid for the new grassy area that once was an unused community garden. This space will be available for use by both their students and Sunset's. Praise God!

**Finance/Budget:** God has demonstrated his overwhelming provision for this church. In the following pages, you will see more details of last fiscal year's financial operations as well as the current fiscal year budget. The following is a breakdown of operations revenue sources for the 2024 fiscal year (October 1, 2023, through September 30, 2024).

- Interiors update of the children's wings to create a fresh and welcoming setting for young families and youth.
- New exterior digital entry signage on Cornell to serve as an invitation to the community to join the Sunset family and the groups that use the facility.

## Fixed Assets and Depreciation

On December 31, 1981, the fixed asset records were established by estimating the fair market values of the land, buildings and improvements, and the furniture and equipment as a whole. Purchases after December 31, 1981, are recorded at cost; donations at estimated fair market value. Depreciation is not stated as an expense on the activity statement in this report. This non-cash item and accumulated result is reflected as accumulated depreciation on the balance sheet.

#### Liabilities

Property financing is currently with Heritage Bank entered into on December 28, 2021. The mortgage balance as of September 30, 2023, was \$2,658,647. The interest rate is 3.3%.

Notes on mortgage:

- 1) Mortgage matures on December 15, 2031
- 2) Mortgage has prepayment penalties during the first 3 years.

## **Basis of Accounting**

Rather, they are designed to meet the informational needs of the congregation by presenting a comparison of the cash-basis budget with actual cash transactions. Statements of cash receipts and expenditures are on a modified cash basis; that is, receipts and expenditures are recorded as the cash transactions occur. Liabilities relating to lease obligations are not reflected on the balance sheet. These liabilities include leases on photocopiers.


Our biggest event of the year, Kids Camp, welcomed 221 kids this year with 164 volunteers coming together for an unforgettable week centered around Noah's Ark. Children sang, danced, created animal masks, drew chalk animals in the parking lot within a lifesize footprint of the Ark, and learned valuable lessons about trusting God through life's storms.

Looking ahead, we are excited to expand classroom space to accommodate the 40% growth in numbers. We've already added **four new classrooms** to this growing ministry!

One of the most significant goals in the coming year is the Sunset Buddies program. I in 5 families have a child with some sort of disability. 90% of families with disabilities do not attend church. (Joni & Friends). We want to welcome children of all abilities into Sunset Kids just as Christ welcomed all children to his side. Join us as we continue this wonderful journey together!







The past year, we had a stellar group of leaders and volunteers who invested in our students weekly. Last year, we wandered the corn maze, packed out DEFY with over 200 middle and high schoolers, started a weekly Bible study, took 34 students to summer camp, and explored what a "successful" small group looks like for a group of middle school students.



Last year, in an effort to be where students are, Carrie Peeples — Middle School Lead — signed up as an AVID tutor with the Beaverton School District. Carrie helped lead a group of peers as they discussed solutions to their current (mostly school) challenges. These discussions gave her opportunities to meet with students almost weekly at Stoller, Cedar Park, and Tumwater Middle Schools. Through these classes, she connected with some of Sunset's youth group students and invested in the middle schoolers in the community. Two of those students attended summper camp, and one started attending Wildfire this fall.

As we begin this year, we're focusing on application and relationship-building between students and leaders. Each week we're asking the questions, "What

does this tell me about who God is? and What does this matter for my day tomorrow?"





We are so grateful and privileged to be a part of the faith journey for the middle schoolers in our community.

As students develop into who they want to become, we're a place where they can connect with others. They'll also learn about applying their faith while having fun too!

What a fantastic year we had in high school youth group! This was a rebuilding year – starting with our first meeting in September. We are celebrating the increased attendance and excitement that we have seen growing and overflowing from week to week. Our team has been intentional about pursuing and inviting students each week. As leaders, our desire is that they know and hear they are loved and welcomed, and we want to see them each week! We walked through the Alpha Youth course, which gave some great framework for faith-based discussions in our small groups.

We had several highlights this past year which included an incredible Youth Sunday in May. The Sunset congregation was able to see and hear from students through the telling of their stories and experiences of weekly youth gatherings, service trips, and camp.

The after-church fundraising lunch was an incredible success, and the generosity of all of YOU made it possible for so many kids to afford camp. We were able to send 47 students and five leaders to high school camp where kids made decisions to follow Jesus and reignited their faith, passion, and pursuit of having a relationship with Christ. We look forward to this next ministry season with great anticipation of helping each of our students understand what it means to be a "sent people" on their school campuses, sports teams, and in their homes. # **Adult Ministries**

## Women's Bible Study

The Lord continues to bless the Women's Bible Study ministry here at Sunset. We had around 200 women participate, and it has been a source of joy for many — a place of support and love to be seen and known through the highs and lows of life. As we studied scripture, we were challenged and experienced the love of Jesus. The teaching, small groups, and special events give a place of belonging and connection for women in our community.



## Sunset Moms

Sunset Moms continues to offer a safe-haven and connection for moms in many stages of life. Our biggest blessing of the last year was seeing God's provision for several needs and ideas. We saw him provide volunteers who stepped in to support our childcare needs. Additionally, Rona Friesen began a homeschool art room to provide creativity and learning for our homeschool kids. She created a welcoming space for them and has truly enriched the ministry. We are grateful to be able to serve a wider scope of mamas through this. We eagerly anticipate continuing to serve local moms in the coming year.

#### **Racial Justice**

The racial justice ministry serves to help build unity in the body of Christ as we facilitate conversations about race. Throughout the year, we brought awareness to honor diversity by celebrating both Black History and Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Month. In February, we had a positive response and good participation as we studied Dominque Gilliard's Subversive Witness book, stewarding what we have to do Kingdom Work well. For AAPI Month in May, our team served Thai-iced tea, mochi, and nori seaweed snacks. We also welcomed Markus Lloyd, founder of Threaded, in July to teach on racial reconciliation and its importance for all believers. We had around 60 participants and facilitators, and we look forward to continuing the conversation with those exploring their faith in 2025.

## Helping Hands Food Pantry and Clothes Closet

The Food Pantry, in cooperation with the Oregon Food Bank, served an average of 1,172 people per month (approximately 350 families). With your generous support, we purchased food items that helped to ensure families had access to healthy, fresh food options. The Clothes Closet served an average of 35 families each week. This ministry relies on generous donations of clothing, shoes, and blankets received from the community and Sunset's congregation. The many volunteers in this ministry serve faithfully and are a light in our community.

#### **Christmas Outreach**

We had a wonderful Christmas season, specifically as we engaged with Operation Christmas Child and Angel Tree. Sunset families shopped and purchased gifts to fill shoeboxes that were then delivered to children around the world through the Operation Christmas Child network. Each box also included materials that shared the message of the Good News of Jesus! For Angel Tree, Sunset volunteers and families made calls to recipients, wrote gift tags, purchased gifts on behalf of a child's incarcerated family member, then gathered to build gift bags filled with treats! We then set out to deliver the gifts. The lobby was filled with excitement and joy as we served together.



# Sunset Missions Prayer Community and Global Partners



Once he began serving on Sunday mornings, several members of the worship team came up to him and invited him and his family to join a small group and connect one-on-one. This was unprompted and exemplifies a thriving ministry wherein our volunteers feel the freedom to boldly invite and include people in their community, along with encouraging them to go deeper in their faith.

One highlight was that we had an awesome Worship Intern serve with us over the summer. She helped bring new life and energy into our church.

This year, Sunset Worship also released an original song – "You Said Yes" – which we sang

as a church in Sunday morning and youth worship services. We also released an arrangement of "O Little Town of Bethlehem" during the advent season.

Art & Practice was an additional highlight during the summer this year. We saw different art pieces that inspired people in the congregation to create based on the nine practices in *Practicing the Way*.
